Dance Lesson Legends

Students from Year 3 to 6 have responded with enthusiasm and creativity to their "Dance EDU sessions". For the past 4 Wednesday's, students have explored different ways to move and work as a group.

Dancing before others can be, for some people, a personally challenging endeavour but any early apprehension our students faced quickly turned to eagerness and excitement when the music took hold and they have encouraged each other's participation.



The movements and choreographic ideas students are creating are incredible. Their ability to collaborate and create mini routines and movements has impressed Kellie, the Dance EDU teacher.

Each week, Kellie is seeing students' confidence and skills progress as they apply the techniques they are taught to their next dance challenge. One thing is for sure, every lesson is nonstop movement, creation, teamwork and fun.

At the completion of the 8 week program students from year 3 to 6 will, in teams, perform a short dance for their class and will receive positive and constructive feedback from their peers.

Foundation to Year 2 students will experience this exciting new program in Term 2.

Vandalism and the J.P. Playground Bark Chips

On the weekend vandals broke bottles in the JP playground and shards of glass were left scattered through the bark chips.

Workman scoured the area and removed all the glass they could find but until we can guarantee that all shards are gone the space is out of bounds. To ensure the area is safe for play we are considering using a bobcat to remove all the bark chips and replacing it with fresh fill. This process will cost over \$15,000.

We therefore ask that parents report to police assistance on 131444 any vandalism or suspicious behaviour they see occurring at the school after hours. Police security will send out a patrol as soon as possible to investigate any problem you raise and ask people who should not be on school grounds to move on.

School Crossing

All students at our school crossing have been trained by the South Australian Police force to STOP traffic. This training is done

every year to ensure students are up to date with any changes and to also refresh their skills. All teachers on the crossing have also been trained by SAPOL.

It is crucial that parents/caregivers or friends DO NOT instruct students when to put signs up or even when to stop traffic. The monitors feel compelled to listen to adults and they are very often given conflicting information to their training. Thank you for your support in this matter.

Kiss and Drop Zone

<u>Please note</u>: The area in front of the school office is a designated drop off and pick up area, Kiss & Drop.

Cars should not be left parked there because they block the space and others are being forced to 'double park' to pick up children. As you can appreciate this is dangerous and illegal. Parents need to wait in their cars, they cannot leave their cars to get out to collect their child. Council fines do apply.

Parents / Caregivers are also reminded that the **Staff Car Park is not** to be used as a drop off and pick up area. Many parents and children use the area as a thoroughfare before and after school and in the past there have been some near misses when people are walking through as cars are backing out.

Safety on Bikes

Please talk with your child about safe road and footpath use. Whilst children under 12 years old are allowed to ride on footpaths, they need to remember that driveways are just like roads.

An adult rider who is supervising a cyclist under 12 may also ride on the footpath.

At a driveway they should stop, look and listen before crossing as a vehicle may be coming in or out.

It is also important not to be riding on the footpath at busy times of the school day, such as drop off and pick up, this is the time to walk your bike to avoiding endangering others.
