Inviting Parent Input into the Formulation of our 2022 Site Improvement Plan

Ardtornish Primary School, like all SA public schools, seeks growth for every student, in every class. To achieve this we regularly establish school Improvement goals as we seek to improve our practices and provide a better education for all students, to build them a stronger future.

Establishing and maintaining our school's performance occurs through ongoing reflective practice and self-review to create opportunities for innovation and is measured through NAPLAN testing in Years 3, 5 & 7 and annual 'Progressive Achievement Testing' for every year level (PAT Testing).

In 2021 our overall school results in NAPLAN exceeded our historical baseline in 11 out of 12 areas of assessment, with the 12^{th} area being maintained.

For the past three years we have kept a strong focus on improving students' reading, mathematics and writing skills. In doing this we have made modifications to 'what we teach' and 'how we teach' in line with what current educational research considers to be best practice. We have embraced technology to support student learning, improved assessment processes and learned a range of new teaching techniques.

On our Pupil Free Day on Monday 8th of November staff will be reviewing our successes and challenges over the past three years and developing a new Three-Year Plan that will set ongoing improvement goals, establish what the challenges are to our practice and determine what our actions will be to meet specific success targets.

As part of our planning, we are inviting parents to contribute to the process of formulating our Site Improvement Plan by sharing their thoughts about the learning progress and experiences of one of their children in the areas of reading, maths and writing.


If your child is going to be away for longer than three days

NAPLAN Reports can be collected from the front office by a parent/caregiver or if you would like your child's report to be sent home with them you can send a text to the school mobile 0447 467 152, giving permission for your child to take it home.



School Card scheme

The School Card scheme offers financial assistance with school fees (materials and services charges) for students attending government schools in each year. If your school fees are less than the School Card subsidy, the scheme can also help with other educational expenses such as uniform, camp and excursion costs.

Eligibility
School Card is available to families with children aged four years and over who attend a school full time

Applications

School Card A
This is the most commonly used school card application. Use this form if you are liable for your child's school fees and

- not. self-employed an independent youth an adult re-entry student a migrant who arrived in Australia after 1 July 2019
- receiving Veteran's Affairs benefits Applying for a foster child in your care.
- chool Card B (hardship, change of circumstances or self-employed)

t where: your income for 2019/20 is over the School Card limits but you experienced hardship in the 2019/2020 financial year

- year you have had a change of financial circumstances during the 2019/2020 financial year up to and including 28 February 2021 you are self-employed.

School Card R (reassessment)
Use if you have submitted an application but were assessed as not eligible and you want to be reassessed

The tables below list the income limits for applications lodged in 2021 – based on the family's gross income in 2019/2020. To qualify for School Card, your family's gross income must be below a certain limit. This limit depends on how many dependent children you have and whether your child attends a government, independent, or Catholic school. You will need to provide proof of income – such as pay slips or Centrelink information. Eligibility income limits for a student attending a government school

Writers Week – Illustrators Awards




